Another successful trip for the Arbour Explorers.







resilience team then spoke to the students about their role in the airport and the students asked him some great questions.


We then had a look at Terminal 2 where £1 billion has been spent updating it - it now has a Manchester theme with all Manchester retailers in the departure lounge.

Great fun was had by everyone!























Building Bridges

Our Nurture and KS3 students transformed into nature's guardians, using their skills to cultivate the Clevelys community gardens and create a thriving schoolyard.











In early November Year II students were given the opportunity to attend an interactive Maths lecture show at the RNCM in Manchester.


This was a fantastic chance to experience the UKs most inspiring Maths speakers presenting Maths live in the context of exciting real life applications.
